## Raphaël Dallaporta The Missing Part

20 January - 23 March 2024

Raphaël Dallaporta's sixth exhibition at the gallery, *The Missing Part*, brings together new and previously unseen works which, through sculpture, drawing, photography and installation, invite us to consider this "thing [that] always eludes us", according to the words discreetly inscribed by the artist on the back of *The Center of the World* (2024). Presented alongside works produced over the past two decades, these contemporary vanitas remind us that twenty years ago, Raphaël Dallaporta was already exploring this genre through an inventory of anti-personnel landmines. Continuing his meditation on our relationship with the movements of the world, and nurturing a link with astronomy and our conquest of knowledge, the artist once again invites each viewer to consider his or her place in the world and its history, and informs us about our own trajectories.

Raphaël Dallaporta's work questions our relationship with the world. With the help of researchers in a variety of fields, Raphaël Dallaporta creates dispositives that invite contemplation through photography, drawing, video, sculpture, installation and books. Often referring to thinkers from Antiquity or the Renaissance, he establishes links between history, science and the arts, to consider the relationship between progress and our own evolution. Winner of the ICP Infinity Award in 2010, the Foam Paul Huf Award in 2011 and the Niépce Award in 2019, he was a resident at the French Academy in Rome - Villa Medici in 2014-2015. Raphaël Dallaporta is the author of a number of critically acclaimed books, most of which were produced with Xavier Barral and Gwinzegal. His work can be found in various institutional collections, including those of the Centre national des arts plastiques, Paris, the Maison Européenne de la Photographie, Paris, the Musée de l'Élysée, Lausanne, the Musée national d'art moderne - Centre Pompidou, Paris, and the New York Public Library. Born in 1980, Raphaël Dallaporta lives and works in Paris. .



Raphaël Dallaporta Here Lies (2024)

Brass bar (175 cm), tripod (95 x 60 x 60 cm), plumb line Installation, overall dimensions variable Unique Raphaël Dallaporta Here Lies (2024) (detail) Here Lies (2024) is a polished brass bar the size of the artist's body, placed on the ground and carefully oriented along a north-south axis like a fragment of a meridian, an imaginary circle that would pass through this point on its way around the Earth via the two poles. The work is accompanied by a second component, a brass plumb bob suspended from a surveyor's tripod, whose shadow cast by the sun at a precise moment allows the bar to be oriented. This second element of the work regains its status as a sculpture in the exhibition space, after having been an instrument.



Pastel and graphite on velin paper 66 x 51 cm (framed-Unique *Big Picture* (2023) could be the biggest of them all. A small color gradient forms a timeline of the universe over 20 billion years, from its origin to its supposed end. It is a scientific hypothesis that an average color of the universe could be determined and that the warming of the galaxies would have caused this hue to evolve from the blue of the origins to a pale yellow. Humanity as a whole would be living in the era of the "cosmic latte".

# Antipersonnel Blast Mine, PDM-57, Soviet Union (2004) from the series Antipersonnel (2004)



Dye-destruction print (Ilfochrome), framed under glass,  $32 \times 26$  cm Text on paper, framed under glass and set with lead seals,  $22.5 \times 8$  cm Edition of 10 + 2 AP of which 8 were produced Antipersonnel (2004) is a photographic inventory of 35 anti-personnel mines made by Raphaël Dallaporta, each accompanied by a brief technical and historical note. Reproduced on a 1:1 scale and outside their field of action, these objects resemble still lifes or vanities, and question our capacity to operate our own disappearance. Antipersonnel Blast Mine, PDM-57, Soviet Union (2004) presents an obsolete model of mine dating from the Second World War, whose wooden frame causes it to decompose, adding to the instability of the device. This project recounts half a century of conflicts and was produced in the context of the Ottawa Treaty, ratified in 1997 by 89 states to forever ban the use of these deadly devices. Each mine photographed here is proof that at least one has been removed from circulation.

PDM-57 Soviet Union

This obsolete antipersonnel blast mine is an improved version of the PDM-6, which was used by the Soviet Union during the Second World War. Decay of the mine's wooden casing means that it becomes increasingly unstable the longer it is left in the ground.

Contact photographic print on baryta paper, 51 x 41 cm, framed Print made in 2023 by Alexandra Catiere Edition of 3 + 1 AP During the solar eclipse of 20 March 2015, while resident at French Academy in Rome - Villa Medici, Raphaël Dallaporta went to the nearby Trinità Dei Monti convent to record the passage of the Moon in front of the Sun, the image of which is reflected by a small mirror on the walls of the astronomical sundial drawn in 1637 by Maignan. The sundial, here operating by reflection, is a recurring device in Raphaël Dallaporta's work. Over the past two decades, the artist has been developing a body of work that invites us to slow down, to contemplate, to search for that feeling of "being in the right place at the right time", as he likes to repeat. Like the momentary alignment of the Earth, Moon and Sun.

Propeller, pin, ink, tracing paper, entomology box Overall dimensions 26 x 19.5 x 5.5 cm Unique Raphaël Dallaporta's *Air Current Sculptures* (2022) are small propellers which, after rotating in various places under the effect of air movements, are presented inert in entomology boxes. Their position, like a compass rose, indicates the direction of the air current when they were activated. For his sculptures, the artist has chosen a dozen generic places -Harbour, Garden, Meridian or Border - that are significant in his life and have universal significance. The sculpture is thus a metaphor for the time spent in a given place. By setting up these anemometers that record nothing in the course of seemingly insignificant experiences, Raphaël Dallaporta questions our own sensitivity and our obsession with recording.

The Center of the World (2024) is an invitation. To open an envelope and find an aphorism about our ability to make the rest of the sky disappear, to experience this phenomenon as magical as it is physiological, using a simple nail and the circle traced with pencil in front of the viewer. The disappearance lasts as long as you concentrate. Here again, an element becomes sculpture, having once been an instrument. Here, everything is metaphor.



Sublimation print on ceramic 10 x 10 cm Unique Part of Raphaël Dallaporta's first project, *O Christmas Tree* (2002) is a photograph, taken on a January night in Paris of an abandoned Christmas tree, wrapped in its dedicated bag like a survival blanket. The image is printed on a ceramic plate, a resistant process, like the effigies that adorn the steles in cemeteries. This unique photograph can be purchased for the value of one month's rent from the artist.








Gelatin silver print on baryta paper, mounted and framed 183 x 123 cm Edition of 1 + 1 AP *Kircher* (2015) is a photographic enlargement of The Great Art of Knowledge, or the Combinatorial Art, historic work published in 1669 that opens with this formula: "Nothing is more beautiful than to know all." The image is thus a portrait of the mind of its author, Athanasius Kircher (1602-1680), a German Jesuit with a fascinating imagination, a professor at the Roman College and a man of all knowledge. The monumentality of this leather binding, with its crater-like cracks, is on a par with the scholar's ambition. This work was presented in 2015 at the Villa Medici in Rome.







Reflector prism, metal base 8 x 6 x 8 cm Engraved signature on back, signed and numbered certificate, wall mounting Edition of 300 The Moon is moving further and further away from us. The distance between the Earth and the Moon has been measured daily by laser shots since man first placed reflectors on the Moon. Raphaël Dallaporta's *Self-Portrait* (2018) is a sculpture composed of a similar reflector that sends the signal back to the transmitter. Faced with this optical device, the viewer will only see the reflection of his or her own eye, symbolically reiterating the round trip of light between the Earth and the Moon.

# Raphaël Dallaporta *Trouble* (2016)







16:9 video, 3 min 30 sec, loop Triptych of black and white instant prints Mounted and framed, each 8.5 x 10.8 cm Overall dimensions 52.5 x 24.5 cm Unique, from a set of four works + 1 AP For *Trouble* (2016), Raphaël Dallaporta returned to the foot of the Pont-d'Arc, the remarkable geological arch beneath which the Ardèche flows, to repeat a simple gesture: to enter the water and photograph the reflections he could observe, thus empirically verifying Heraclitus of Ephesus' fragment: "You cannot enter the same river twice". He realised a video recording of this action, as well as a succession of Polaroids, each of which printed a different image of the surface of the water as a result of the waves produced by the artist's movements. With *Trouble*, Raphaël Dallaporta pays homage to his friend Jean-Paul Curnier (1951-2017).










Raphaël Dallaporta The Dark Side of the Moon (2015)



Ambrotype wet collodion on glass 31 x 25 cm (framed) Unique The dark side of the Moon is the hemisphere of the Moon that is permanently on the side opposite the Earth and remains invisible from our planet. It was first observed by a Soviet probe. For *The Dark Side of the Moon* (2015), Raphaël Dallaporta appropriated a photograph produced in 1966 by the US space programme. The work presents a circular fragment of the original image, showing the Korolev crater, named after Sergei Korolev (1906-1966), the founder of the Soviet space programme whose identity was not revealed until after his death. Mounted on a black background, the photograph is an ambrotype, a precious process that provided the first details of the Moon in the 19th century.
